### **Global Environmental Politics (in English)**

This seminar accompanies the public lecture series "Stockholm+50: Five decades of global environmental governance", Mon. 16:15-17:45 (attendance required). Heads of state met for the first time to address global environmental problems 50 years ago, in Stockholm in 1972, for the United Nations (UN) Conference on the Human Environment. Since then, the world has witnessed many environmental summits and appeals for sustainable development, most recently, the Climate Change Conference in Glasgow. While climate change receives the most attention, in 2015, the UN General Assembly adopted the 2030 Agenda with a set of wide-ranging goals that articulate the desired outcome of sustainable development in diverse areas: the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

The course and lecture series start with "the green targets" of Agenda 2030, i.e. SDG 13 (Climate Action), SDG 15 (Life on Land), SDG 14 (Life below Water) and SDG 6 (Clean Water and Sanitation). The following sessions cover the SDGs with environmental trade-offs and synergies, in particular, SDG 2 (Food Security), SDG 5 (Gender Equality), SDG 7 (Affordable and Clean Energy), SDG 8 (Decent Work and Economic Growth) and SDG12 (Responsible Consumption and Production). In addition, we look at the role that cities (SDG 11) and partnerships (SDG 17) might play for an environmentally sound implementation of Agenda 2030 and conclude with a synthesis.

Students prepare and moderate each public lecture. Instead of a classic term paper (Hausarbeit), students conduct and transcribe an interview with a guest lecturer based on his/her manuscript (in addition to preparing an abstract of the lecture manuscript, see below). The aim is to outline the full spectrum of sustainability perceptions, to identify governance failure and responsibilities, and to allow developing alternative and innovative approaches to accelerate a transition to sustainability.

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## Exam and grading (case study)

All lecture manuscripts are mandatory course readings. In addition to the course sessions, each student moderates at least one lecture followed by a Q&A session. The transcription of this Q&A session and

an extra interview with the lecturer substitute a classic Hausarbeit (term paper). Therefore, the interviews and transcripts need to reference the course readings, including a literature list at the end. The length should be max 2,000 words per student (if you conduct and transcribe an interview together, please indicate who is responsible for which part). After discussion in class, shorten the transcript to 500-600 words to be included in a book along with the respective lecture manuscript as a chapter. In addition, please prepare an abstract of max 1,000 words (if you work individually, the abstract can be shorter). The guiding questions should serve you to structure the interviews and to link the lectures to each other.

Please send the Q&A/ interview transcripts and abstracts as word files to <a href="lena.partzsch@fu-berlin.de">lena.partzsch@fu-berlin.de</a> no later than two weeks after the respective lecture (9 May for the lecture on 25 April, and so forth)! Ensure that you indicate all names of involved course participants in the document and provide your student/matriculation number in the email text.
